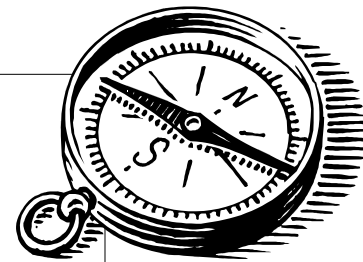

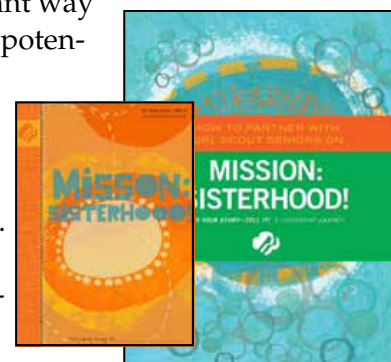

It's Your Story—Tell It!

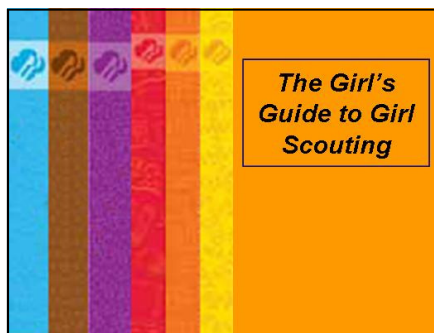
Third Set of Journeys Coming December 2010!

The *It's Your Story—Tell It!* journey series, to be released in December 2010, uses a storytelling theme in a fun and grade-level relevant way for girls to better understand themselves and their potential. Through hearing stories, sharing their stories, trying out new roles and creating and building the beginning, middle, and end to their own stories, girls gain confidence and see that they can make a difference in their own lives and the lives of others. 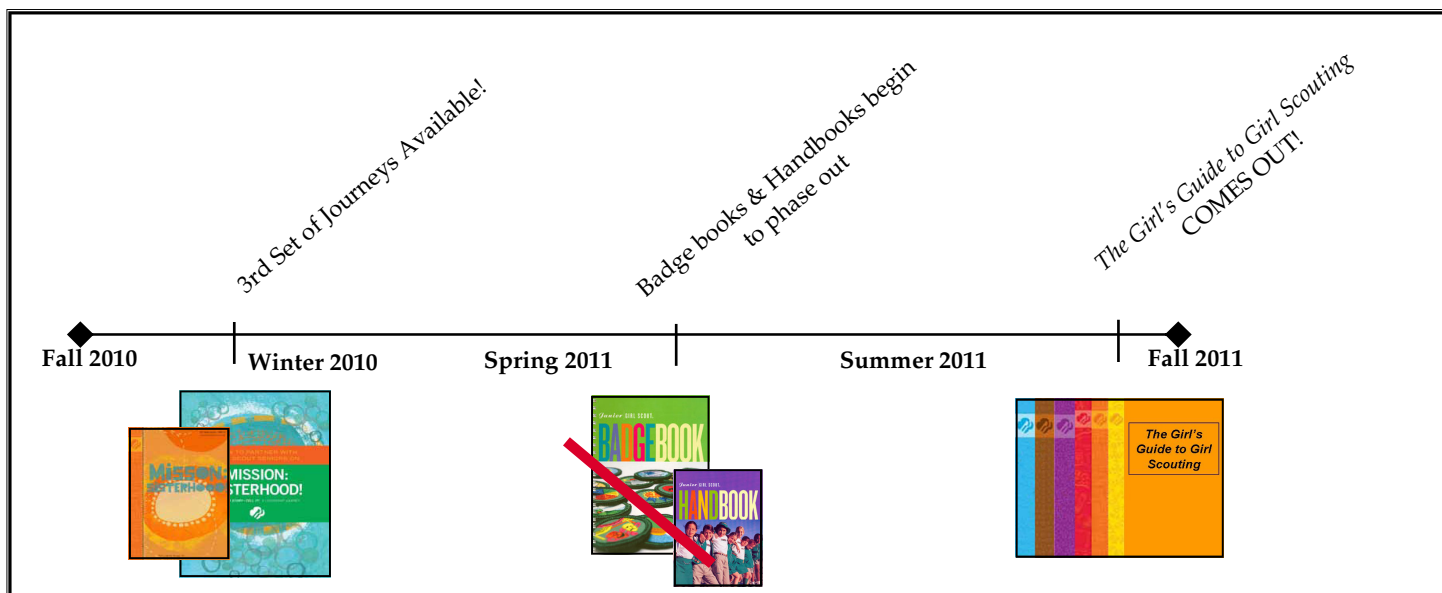

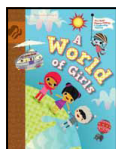
It's Your Story – Tell It!

The next set of journeys arrives in December 2010!



Daisies: *5 Flowers, 4 Stories, 3 Cheers for Animals!*

(THEME: Caring for Animals) Daisies learn just how much they can care for animals and for themselves—and just how good that makes them feel.



Brownies: *A World of Girls*

Brownies learn how stories contain clues about what they can change for the better in the world for girls.



Juniors: *aMUSE*

(THEME: Trying on Roles) Juniors learn just how many roles are available to them and the possibility these roles open for them.



Cadettes: *MEdia*

(THEME: Putting the ME in Media) Cadettes learn how they can shape media—for themselves, their communities and the world.



Seniors: *MISSION: SISTERHOOD!*

(THEME: The Power of Friendship for Taking Action) Seniors learn how widening their networks broadens their experiences and benefits the world, too.



Ambassadors: *BLISS: Live It! Give It!*

Ambassadors learn to dream big, now and for their future, and begin their legacy as leaders who see that others achieve their dreams, too. ♦

Frequently Asked Questions regarding Journeys

Q. What resources are offered for each journey series?

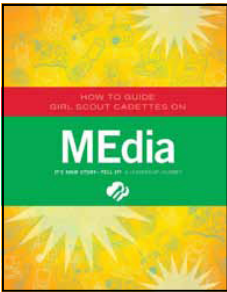
A. Each journey series offers six books for girls and six adult guides, each created for a specific Girl Scout grade level: Daisy (K-1), Brownie (2-3), Junior (4-5), Cadette (6-8), Senior (9-10) and Ambassador (11-12). Each journey also comes with an online map that shows how all the fun of Girl Scouting—cookies, camping, badges, trips, etc.—fit right into a leadership journey. Additionally, resources such as *It's Your Journey—Customize It!*, offer even more tips and ideas for making the most of journeys.



Q. What is in the girls' book?

A. The girls' book for each journey provides fun and engaging content and activities that girls can enjoy and learn from on their own as well as in a group, troop, event, or series setting. Journey content ranges from fictional stories, games, and puzzles to real-life stories about women in a range of careers.

Q. What is in a journey adult guide?



A. The adult guide for each journey offers an introduction to the journey's theme and awards, grade-level-specific tips and suggestions. The guide has a full set of Sample Session plans filled with ceremonies, activities, discussions, and reflections that adults can use as they guide girls through a journey at Girl Scout meetings, gatherings, and events. The adult guides also provide detailed instructions, examples, activities, and discussion starters to bring the journey to life in partnership with girls. In addition, guides show how the journey content of the girls' book relates to and acts as a springboard for group activities.

Q. How do journeys benefit girls?

A. Journeys are the core national program of Girl Scouting and are based on the Girl Scout Leadership Experience. This means each journey has girls using Girl Scouting's three keys to leadership: Discover, Connect, and Take Action. As the core Girl Scout program, journeys tie to the 15 national Girl Scout leadership outcomes and the three processes (Girl Led, Learning by Doing, and Cooperative Learning) that make Girl Scouting distinct from school and other activities.

Q. Can girls earn awards on a journey?

A. Yes. Girl Scouts at each grade level have a chance to earn leadership awards as they complete steps along the journey. Awards are designed to be worn on the Girl Scout uniform. Daisies, Brownies, Juniors, and Cadettes have the chance to earn several badges along a journey. Seniors and Ambassadors can mark their accomplishments at the culmination of a journey with a pin or iron-on patch. Steps for earning the awards are explained in each adult guide and in each girls' book except for the Daisy book.



Q. What does it mean to "customize" a journey?

To customize a journey means to make it your own. Girl Scout leadership journeys only come to life when girls and volunteers sprinkle in their own interests and talents, and their creativity and imagination, to shape the journey experience. Customizing a journey also means calling upon a range of local experts (individuals and organizations) who can connect to the journey theme being explored and enrich the girls' experience. Along with the tips and suggestions in the girls' book and the adult guide on how to customize a journey, the GSUSA resource, *It's Your Journey—Customize It!* can guide volunteers and council staff in bringing the excitement of the journeys to girls in ways that best suits their interests and needs. ♦

“A Girl’s Guide to Girl Scouting” – September 2011

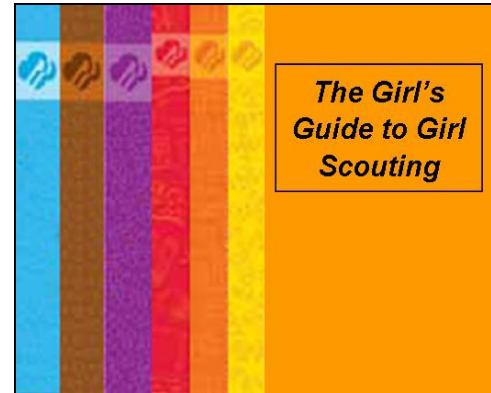
The Girl’s Guide to Girl Scouting, (or GGGS) a girl handbook, will have one book available for each program level - Daisy through Ambassador. Although self-described as a book for girls, this book is considered to be a sufficient leader resource as well.

This book will have three main sections:

1. Girl Scout Traditions
2. Cookie Sale Program Activities
3. Earned Awards (badges, religious awards, Bronze, Silver, Gold)

Each girl will want her own copy since the “Girl’s Guide” will contain information such as:

- Girl Scout history
- Girl Scout traditions
- What’s special about being a Girl Scout
- List of emblems and awards (i.e. membership stars, GSUSA strip, council strip, etc.)
- Awards log
- Diagram of sash/vest with badge placement
- Bridging award requirements for relevant program level
- Bronze, Silver, Gold Award requirements for relevant program levels
- Additional program information for each level such as Program Aide or Counselor in Training info
- Journey map for relevant program level
- Map showing all the councils and special Girl Scout places (i.e., the Juliette Gordon Low Birthplace, World Centers, etc.) ♦

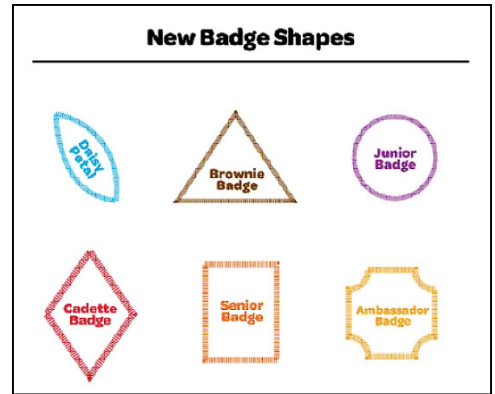

What's Happening With Badges?



What's Happening with Badges?

Skill-building badges remain an important part of the Girl Scout program. As promised, Girl Scouts of the USA is working on new badges for Brownies – Ambassadors, and new content for Daisies to enjoy as they earn their petals. The new badges will offer a great mix of tradition, variety, fun and challenge. They will have the shapes pictured in the box to the right.



In a more inclusive, less-jargon heavy approach, all shapes (except the petals) will be referred to as badges. No more "Try-Its", "Interest Project Patches", etc. Everything remains the same except the name. The shape and the content or focus of the awards will be nothing new.



What happens to the existing badges and other resources like Studio 2B?

Some are remaining (see Legacy badges below) while some are being retired over the next 18 months. The goal is for Girl Scouts in the United States to be participating in the national program – Leadership Journeys and The Girl's Guide to Girl Scouting – by June 2012.

Here's a few of the categories of badges that will be available:

Legacy Badges – to honor the past and keep badges relevant to today's girls, new content will be incorporated into the topics that have been a part of Girl Scouting since the beginning. These badges will be offered for Brownies through Ambassadors: Artist, Athlete, Citizen, Cook, First Aid, Naturalist, The Girl Scout Way.

Financial Literacy Badges – these awards will be offered for Daisies through Ambassadors. (Daisies will have two "leaves" to add around their Daisy petals.) Through these, girls will learn how to: use money wisely to reach goals, be educated consumers, develop business skills for the workplace, become independent women who can support themselves and give back to their communities.



Cookie Badges – these badges will also be offered for Daisies through Ambassadors. (Daisies will, once again, earn two additional "leaves" to add around their Daisy petals and Promise Center.) Through these recognitions, girls will learn business skills through the practical application of the cookie sale.

Some other categories of badges will include religious recognition, lifesaving awards, specialty badges and more.












How will the Journeys and the new badges work together?

Journeys engage girls in exploring Girl Scouting's three keys to leadership. Badges provide skill-building opportunities in a variety of topics that are part of the Girl Scout legacy (like nature, art, cooking, sports, first aid and more) and topics girls love like photography, design, animals and car care. The new badges will have fun ideas about how earning them links to the Journey experiences. ♦

Reporting Expectations for Troop Money Management



Educators who offer courses or impromptu consulting on money management need to stay abreast of new guidelines. One major change is that we are no longer using the *A150 Troop Money Manager Report*. Instead of trying to recall bank information and expenses while filling out this form, leaders are now expected instead to copy **monthly bank statements and receipts for all transactions, and submit them** to the Service Unit Manager or the Service Unit Money Manager. This should be an easier (and more accurate process) for leaders and advisors. Rather than filling out the complicated form and looking up the account number and all the expenses from the last time you submitted the form, leaders can now just keep an envelope of receipts and make a copy of the check-card statement that comes in the mail each month. Turn it in at monthly Service Unit meetings (or at the very least—four times a year). **Note:** An ATM withdrawal receipt does not qualify as a receipt for troop purchases. Troop checks may not be made out to cash. All purchases made with cash require detailed receipts of the transactions.

The Service Unit Money Manager is still responsible for completing the *S750 SU Annual Troop Financial Report* in June of each year based on information gathered from the bank statements and Troop Money Managers.

Stay current—Check-out Money Manager Resources (formerly known as lounges), under “For Adults”. On our website. You will find a number of pages explaining money processes. Under Education opportunities you will find the online training, *144 Troop Money Management Tutorial*, with updated changes. ♦

Forms for Troop Trips - Changes to B240 and B241

At the August Kickoffs we announced the revision of the B220 back to its simplified purpose of allowing a troop to reserve a site on any of our council camps. Now, subsequent changes have been made to the remaining Troop Trip forms to mirror the changes to the B220. Educators who offer Basic Leadership courses or Troop Travel courses should note:

The B240 Notification Form—should be submitted:

- For overnights
- For camping at a non-council camp
- For day trip more than 51 miles outside council boundaries.

The B241—Special Notification Form—should be submitted:

- Prior to troop trips that are 3 nights or longer
- For trips 201 miles outside the council boundaries
- For international trips.

Notification Form

Two weeks prior to overnights, camping on non-GSCNC sites, and day trips between 51 and 200 miles outside GSCNC boundaries. Notification Form B240 must be submitted to GSCNC.

Four to six weeks prior to trips of 3 nights or more, trips further than 201 miles outside GSCNC boundaries, and international trips. Special Notification Form B241 must be submitted to GSCNC.

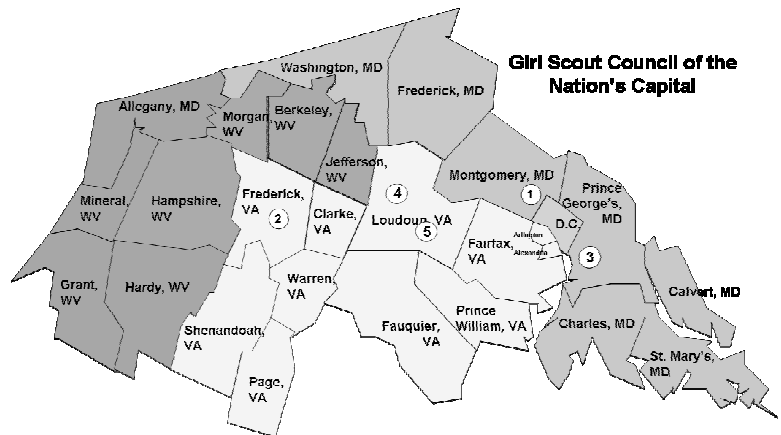

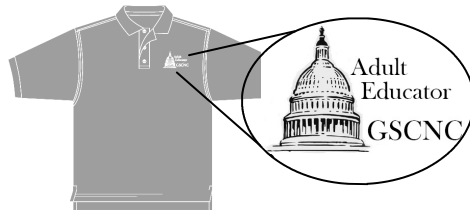
